The Tech Trek camp at UCSD this year (June 23-28) was a HUGE success. We sent 11 girls from seven middle schools. We received excellent feedback from the families. One of the camper's moms was so inspired by the program that she joined our branch and wants to be active in the TT program. Thank you to <u>Karen McGurk</u> for volunteering during camp registration and <u>Sapna Mehta</u> who was an instructor for Engineering and Robotics.

We also sponsored one girl for the virtual Tech Trek camp this year (July 21 – 26). The virtual

camp continues to be a popular option, so it will likely continue to be offered as an alternative to in-person camp. We believe, however, the in-person camp has greater overall benefits for the girls and we strongly encourage them to attend in person.

We have invited this year's campers to our September 14 brunch meeting, when they will each give us a short description of their camp experience. Be sure to put this date on your calendar so you can attend! <u>Please make an</u> effort to chat with the girls and their families and help them feel welcome during social time.

We are very pleased to have received grants of \$5,000 from Hologic and \$4,000 from the Rotary Club of Rancho Bernardo to support the Tech Trek program. A special shout-out to <u>Benita Page</u> and <u>Shirley Napierela</u>, who both generously donated funds and their time and were integral in securing the Rotary sponsorship. We are very grateful for their support! And thank you to <u>Aresa Toukdarian</u> for her grant-writing and fundraising efforts! As our club grows, we will send as many girls to camp as we can financially support and can administratively manage. We hope to send 12 girls to camp next year. One of our members, <u>Sapna Mehta</u>, will be on the State Committee for Tech Trek.

Each middle school we work with has a Tech Trek school liaison who is a huge help to us in selecting girls for the camp. As a thank-you for their efforts, we gave each of the school liaisons an AAUW Tech Trek metal stemless wine goblet.

Introducing our re-entry scholarship awardees! You can meet them in person at our September 14 General Meeting and brunch at the Eastview RB Community Center.

A native of Tecate, Baja California, **Elena Alcaraz** has been an honor student in the San Diego County Community College system, completing her studies there in the behavioral sciences. She will be entering **Pt. Loma Nazarene University** in the fall. Elena's success has been hard won. After overcoming the trauma of human trafficking and a near fatal brush with COVID in 2020, she devoted herself to raising her daughter, her volunteer work with survivors of human trafficking, and to her studies. Today she counsels others at the National Alliance on Mental Illness' Next Steps Program and plans to earn an advanced degree as a Clinical Psychologist.

Olivia Fentress is on the path to her ultimate goal which is to earn her BA in Psychology with an emphasis on music therapy from **CSU San Marcos**, where she has been accepted for this fall. Olivia has an extensive background in volunteerism with homeless and at-risk youth and victims of spousal abuse, has taught the fundamentals of music composition, production and recording, and she organizes events and activities for the elderly.

Jana Tran is a resident of Rancho Penasquitos and is currently attending the University of North Texas online as a sophomore. After taking time out to help support her family for several years, Jana has returned to college, now studying toward her bachelor's degree in organizational design, consumer behavior, and data analytics. Her concentrations are intertwined with the industry in which she works as a full-time eCommerce conversion rate optimization specialist and project team leader.

Brenda Nguyen's studies at UC Riverside toward a degree in Business Economics were interrupted, as with so many women scholars, by "extenuating life circumstances." Roxanne Word is a returning student currently majoring in geography in the **San Diego Community College** system with the professional goal of geographer/GIS specialist. Roxanne calls her work in falconry an "unconventional career path" and has been featured in the L.A. Times and other media. Her unusual career has allowed her to train others in the field and pursue her passion for social and environmental issues. Ultimately, her plan is to transfer to George Mason University in Virginia for their accelerated masters program in geography.

Public Policy Updates from AAUW California shared by Marie Dye

Although the 2024 legislative session won't end until this fall, the governor has already started to sign bills. We are excited to let you know that three bills on our agenda have already been signed: AB 1955, AB1790, and AB2608. Hooray!

2023-2025

AB 1955 will prohibit school districts from requiring staff to notify parents if a student uses a different name or pronouns or identifies as a different gender than what is on their birth certificate. California is the first state in the nation to ban forced outings of transgender students.

AB 1790 will strengthen protections against sexual assault and harassment at California State University (CSU) campuses by requiring two reports from CSU on the status of their implementation of the State Auditor recommendations. AB 2608 will require the California Community Colleges and the CSUs, and request the University of California, to provide educational and preventive information on sexual violence and harassment, including how to recognize if someone is at risk of drug-facilitated sexual assault.

A school board candidate questionnaire is now available, courtesy of the AAUW Fallbrook affiliate. This is an excellent vetting tool. If a candidate approaches you for an endorsement or other support, ask them to complete this questionnaire https://www.aauwca.org/documents/2024/06/ppschool-board-candidatequestionnaire-responses.pdf/.

Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic and charter schools that do not meet public school civil rights and accountability standards

I understand the shark repellent we developed is being used today for downed space equipment—strapped around it so the sharks won't attack when it lands in the ocean."
